Plan ahead of a wildfire emergency. Register for *VC Alert* - readyventuracounty.org/vc-alert for evacuation notifications and print copies of this 2-sided pdf for your home and family. An **Evacuation Order** means evacuate NOW, don't wait. An **Evacuation Warning** means you have enough time to pack and prepare your house before evacuation. **Shelter-In-Place** means to go quickly to the nearest designated shelter.

	If there is time to communicate, email or text your plans to family, friends and neighbors.		Attach garden hoses to outdoor taps and place full buckets of water around for firefighter use.
	Carpool to reduce traffic while evacuating. If you have more than one car, take only one.		Keep ladders handy at house corners for firefighter roof access.
	Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened.		Seal attic and ground vents with plywood or commercial seals.
	Know your shelter-in-place options depending on fire behavior.		Don't leave sprinklers/water running as it can lower water pressure.
	Park your car in your driveway, facing out, with windows and doors shut, ready to evacuate.		If possible, park all extra cars at least 30 ft away from any structure.
